# HATTIE WEBER MUSEUM

There's been a bit of excitement around the Hattie Weber Museum the past couple of weeks. Searching for artifacts in our collection for display at the Gibson House, we discovered a Buffalo Gun. We knew we had the gun (well, the barrel and trigger, the stock is missing), but we weren't aware of its background. Seems we have a .45 caliber, 23 inch barrel one-shot monster manufactured by Sharps, probably in 1874, and found in Davis during an excavation in 1951 by Gray Rowe, who gave it to us. Dennis Dingemans has been researching it with input from Virginia Isaacs, whose archaeologist son, Paul, is aware of the gun and its discovery. It may be quite rare.

On a more prosaic note, we have closed the brick sales for this year. We sold 37 bricks. They will be laid in the Rose Garden and dedicated on May 8, in honor of specified mothers, grandmothers, and other exceptional women. Members of the Society are cordially invited to attend the dedication at 2 p.m. and the reception which follows.

We celebrated Picnic Day (more soberly than some) with an exhibit of "Picnic Days Past" based on programs from the 60's and 70's from John Lofland's collection which he graciously allowed us to copy, and donations of early Farm building photographs by an anonymous donor.

Coming up on May 22 is the first (of several, we hope) Downtown Davis History Walks to be led by Gerri Adler, longtime Davis resident and businesswoman. Tickets are \$10 per person and the group size is limited to 10. Tickets may be purchased through the Hattie Weber (445 C Street, Davis, 95616) or at Gerri's shop, Lasting Impressions, on 4<sup>th</sup> Street. They are sure to go fast, so get your orders and payments in early.

## INDEXES TO OLD YOLO COUNTY NEWSPAPERS

The Childers Index to Old Yolo County Newspapers is available. CDs have just been re-arranged so that the indexes (about five files - divided by newspaper and by decades) are now on one CD. If anyone wants a copy, they can write, or call, Dennis Dingemans (530) 753-5959) and he will "burn"/make a DC and send it to you. Free for the first dozen or so. These indexes are arranged in the order of the name of the person mentioned in the papers (for each mention of the person, you get the page, column, date, and name of the newspaper). Microfilm copies are available at various libraries and archives - and Childers' has an introductory essay that tells you where you can get/use each of the papers.

#### LOCAL AUTHOR PUBLISHES NEW BOOK ON CENTRAL VALLEY HISTORY

A new book by Ann Foley Scheuring will be available at the Historical Society's Booth at the May Festival. Titled *Valley Empires: Hugh Glenn and Henry Miller in the Shaping of California*, the book describes the careers of two extraordinary men who helped put the Central Valley on the world map in the nineteenth century.

Ann and her husband David, long time Yolo County residents, live and farm in the Capay Valley. Ann is making her latest book available to the Society at a reduced price to benefit both the Society and its members. You may purchase *Valley Empires* from the Society for the special price of \$20.00, plus tax.

Hugh Glenn and Henry Miller were known in their lifetimes as the "Wheat King" and the "Cattle King." While other titans made fortunes in mining and railroads, these two were profoundly influential in shaping the development of rural California. The author has told their stories against the backdrop of struggling times as the great valley evolved from a raw frontier into some of the most productive farmland in the world.

Written to be readable as well as authoritative, the 320-page narrative includes the murder that ended the career of Hugh Glenn, California's biggest wheat grower and a candidate for governor in a hard-fought election – and how a penniless German immigrant named Henry Miller amassed a million acres, dominated western meat markets, and put his mark on California water law. The book describes the rise in the state's bonanza wheat trade, the development of transportation, and changes in the cattle industry. It includes 20 illustrations, a bibliography, and an index.
