The Hattie Weber Museum of Davis Annual Report 2011-2012

The following is submitted to the City of Davis describing various aspects of the operation of The Hattie Weber Museum of Davis (Museum) for fiscal year 2011-2012 by the Yolo County Historical Society (YCHS) pursuant to its contract with the City.

Visitors:

The total number of visitors recorded at the Museum: **3,476** - an increase of **956** over last year. Pig Day in March set the single day record at **161**.

Visitors who signed the guest book (not all do) came from **60** California cities other than Davis, **28** states other than California, plus the District of Columbia and **14** countries other than the United States. Mexico, China, Taiwan, Korea, India, Slovenia, Thailand, Brazil, Israel, Japan, England, France, Canada and Italy were recorded.

Four Scout troops and two classes of third graders also visited and enjoyed presentations by Assistant Director Adrian Gabriel and Director Dingemans. We hope to increase our outreach to Davis third graders next year.
